Letter From ATF:

The following letter was sent in response to one that I wrote to the ATF on March first of this year, asking for clarification on the issue of background checks and our members, due to the new Safe Explosives Act requirements. I argued in my letter that the requirements for the industry should not be the same for the clubs since we were a volunteer organization and did not sell shows or fireworks. Their response follows and is some of the best news that I've heard since this Act was passed.

This is in response to your letter dated March 1, 2003, in which you requested information about the Safe Explosives act of 2002 (the Act) and how it may affect pyrotechnic clubs.

In your letter, you state that the Western Pyrotechnic Association has a valid Federal explosives user permit and allows your members to set off display fireworks at club events. You further state that you allow your members to manufacture explosive materials under the club's permit outside at two club events each year.

As you are probably aware, the Act was enacted on November 25, 2002. The Act, in part, requires all persons who receive explosive materials to possess a Federal explosives license or permit. The Act also, in part, requires all persons who are employees of a Federal explosives licensee or permittee and who will possess explosive materials during the course of their employment to submit identifying information to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) for the purposes of conducting a background check.

As a fireworks club that holds a valid Federal explosives users permit, you may sponsor fireworks events at which volunteer club members may possess explosive materials while assisting in supervised shoots, as long as their assistance is under the direction or control of the club. Their assistance is only lawful under the following circumstances.

The club must have lawfully received the fireworks pursuant to a valid Federal permit or license, the exception in section 845 (a) (3), or other appropriate exception;

An authorized club employee or responsible person receives and possesses the fireworks used in the show in the scope of his employment and on behalf of the club;

The volunteer member's possession is under direction or control of the authorized club employee or responsible person; and;

The club has no knowledge that the volunteer member is a prohibited person.

The club may not, however, provide fireworks or other explosive materials to your volunteer members for their shooting events. If this were to occur, you may be distributing explosives in violation of Federal law and the members may be receiving explosives in violation of Federal law.

The volunteer members are not club employees or responsible persons and, as such, the club is not required to report them on an ATF F 5400.28, Employee/Possessor Questionnaire. The volunteer club members are subject to the prohibited persons categories, however, and the club may not allow volunteer members who they know are prohibited persons to possess explosive materials.

The same restrictions and circumstances would apply to the manufacturing of explosive materials at a club sponsored event. Additionally, the club must maintain the manufacturing records required by 27 CFR 555.123.

Clean Up Fees. Proposed: Add a clean up fee (\$10) to registration fee for each event. The people who show up for clean up will get their money back; those who don't show up will forfeit their money. Those who stay until the end of clean up will divide up the remaining funds. Ken Barton of the Texas Fireants and Joe Demorico of the Crackerjacks explained both these clubs do this with success. Motion passed.

Treasurer's Report
Current Balance = \$66,000. Profit/Loss statement will be published in the newsletter. The expense of added equipment for Do-It will be amortized over the next few years. Kief spoke about our liability insurance. Spreading out the insurance payments has helped cash flow. John Allen has invited two underwriters from Lloyd's of London to see how we handle our events with the hope that our insurance premiums will be lowered in the future. Russ spoke of WWB - 780 attendees, and we received approx. \$7000 in on site signups. Kief said Lake

Havasu City gave WPA \$15,000 and next year this amount will go up to \$17,500.

This Could Happen Where You Live Edition

You are a normal, pyrotechnic loving enthusiast. You are patriotic and love the 4th of July. You are licensed to shoot display shows and have a great safety record, and desire to

In order to obtain/storage/display class II shells, you have to have your federal license and appropriate storage magazines, so go about the process of obtaining explosive/explosives magazines, and then apply and obtain all of the required federal licenses. Life is good. You are safe, legal, and ready for business.

A new employee in the fire administration is appointed. This person is really unknowledgable about fireworks rules, and especially federal law, so you try to offer your view of how to interpret fireworks rules, but this person seems to have other ideas, all of which conflict with your rock-solid proof in the CFR book of regulations. It seems as though this person is being coached by a larger company in your state who has befriended and taken the fire authority under their wing. In recent years, this larger company has, step by step, annoyed what little competition they had, by having the smaller businesses shut down with lies that they have sold the State and Local authorities, as well as ATF.

A rule is passed saying that you can only conduct public display shows with product purchased through "an Oregon Approved Wholesaler" and there seems to be only a handful of them, and only one of them who can store in your state. To truck the fireworks in from out of state on the same day of the show would be a safety hazard, and wouldn't give you time to properly fine and choreograph the display, but if you bought from the in-state company, you wouldn't be able to afford the display since they have raised their price to such a high level that it wouldn't allow you to make a profit from your work.

You decide to import the show in from out of state for cost reasons and you instantly receive a phone call from the fire authority asking why you have "chipped wholesalers" to which you reply, "because they are 1/4th the price of our in-state wholesaler". There is no response on the other line. You start noticing that everyone else you know has had their permits processed already, even though you had applied earlier than them. Your friends had purchased from your "in-state wholesaler" and they have been receiving their fireworks already. They don't have storage magazines to store them, but rather they are placing the boxes in their garages and outbuildings. You know that it's a violation, but you don't say anything. You then inquire about being a wholesaler yourself, and are told not to send your application in, because the fire authority doesn't know anywhere in Oregon that you could legally operate. You see, while the in-state business was getting rid of their competition, they passed a zoning law which could not be met by anyone in the industry, and declared themselves to be grandfathered in. You pick up the phone and complain to the Attorney General's Office, not knowing that the AG's office recommends:

the Fire Marshals Office. You file a complaint against the OFSM and the monopolizing wholesaler and the next day you are raided by fire deputies and state police. They claim to have a warrant, and start searching your property, trashing everything in site, looking for anything that resembles a firework, sifting through your personal belongings, scolding at you with looks of disapproval. They cut your steel magazines open with high speed grinders, throwing sparks everywhere. Inside you are glad that they are empty, and you wonder how these people have lived to be as old as they are. You have been arrested for suspicion of storing fireworks in violation of state zoning laws, but since you don't have any fireworks stored, you don't know how they could have possibly obtained a warrant. You also wonder how all of your friends could be storing their fireworks in their garage or house without having any legal problems. YOU are the only one who has properly approved storage for them, yet you are being harassed. In the back of your mind, you wonder if it's because you have filed a complaint with the state. When it is discovered that you haven't even received your fireworks is simple call to the out of state wholesaler was all they needed to do they release you and leave in a hurried rush. It is three days before the Fourth of July, the last weekday you had to get your work done before the stores closed, and the day is gone. They leave you upset, broken hearted, and confused. WHY would they do this to you? You hadn't done anything wrong.

You call a lawyer who is confused about the whole ordeal and says that he needs \$1,000.00 retainer to talk to you, but since you weren't charged with anything, only arrested and released, there is nothing to take to court. You want to sue for their damage, but the retainer is more than the damage...at least, provable damage. A couple days later, you drive out of state with your DOT approved truck and pick up your shells. You had to drive through the night in order to pick them up early and transport them back in time to set up your display show. You are tired, but short on time, and it's a miracle that you able to complete the unbelievable job ahead of you.

The display is over, and everything went well. The huge crowd has left, thinking that whoever had done that show must have made an obscene amount of money, not knowing that it had actually cost you much more money than you had received.

You begin asking questions about the ordeal last Friday, and you realize that you aren't alone. The same thing had just happened to a family about an hour away from you just two weeks prior. They too, had chosen not to purchase from the in-state wholesaler. Only, this person had his fireworks stored (in his approved storage magazine) and the Fire Marshals had stolen them and left them in the local evidence room of the County. His show was a charity for his rotary club, a fund raiser for crippled children. You speak with him and find that he hadn't broken any laws either, except for that bizarre zoning rule, and he wasn't charged with any violation either. The in-state wholesaler / display company had "saved the day" by doing the display instead, and respect the rewards of their monopoly. You discover that this kind of event has been happening all across your state, but people are afraid to do or say anything.

One day, several years later, and after many years of grief trying to deal with the abuse that the State Fire Marshal and the monopoly have been dealing you, you read that an "in-state company" is in violation of zoning laws. These are the same zoning laws that they have used to prevent you and everyone else in the state, from operating. According to state law, they should have their license revoked, but the State Fire Marshal is doing nothing. Days turn into months, and over a year goes by, with no action taken against the company, yet still other companies are being denied a wholesale license due to the same zoning rules. This just doesn't make any sense. How could it be?

Then you hear about an amendment to a bill that has been stuck through the Senate and is going through the legislature. This bill would exempt ONLY the "in-state wholesaler" from state law. The criminals who have prevented you and everyone else from operating are now trying to make themselves the only legal company in the state? How can this possibly be? You discover that this is a violation of your State Constitution. You are outraged. How could one company have so much power? How could one company cause so much heart ache and grief to so many people with out consequences?

You continue digging and keep finding evidence of relationships, financial interests and political interests. You discover hidden owners. You start finding out who is financing who. Your proposed Civil Rights lawsuit is becoming a reality and you wonder how come you have to pay a group of lawyers to have the same basic rights as an illegal operation.

Every morning, you wake up, and come to the realization that this is not a nightmare, but a reality. There is criminal activity happening in the State of Oregon. You've done almost all you can and lay back down for a moment, and pray.

Even though this may not have happened to you, it is important to realize that it could easily become a reality in each of the states we operate in. It is imperative that each and every one of us become aware of pending legislation that would inhibit our ability to operate, not only as business ventures, but as operators and hobbyists. Current legislation in Texas is a prime example where the wrong people make uneducated legislation. This happened in the 1970's in Arizona, the site of our two conventions. If this group fails to act, then we should not cry out in pity for our inaction. Get involved and stay involved not only in this organization, but with local groups who are looking out for your best interest.

Report of the Fireworks Foundation By John Steinberg, on behalf of the Trustees of the Fireworks Foundation

A majority of the trustees of the Foundation met on April 5, 2003. On behalf of the Foundation, we wish to express our gratitude to the members of the PGI for funding the Foundation by making an initial grant and by paying the costs associated with the formation of this Foundation.

As previously reported, the Foundation now enjoys IRS Section 501(c)(3) status. Donations made to the Foundation are fully tax-deductible for the donor. In granting the tax deductible status to the Fireworks Foundation, the IRS now requires that the Foundation solicit and receive donations and make appropriate expenditures of funds consistent with the mission in its charter.

We are committed, as previously stated, to preserving intact, an amount of principal equal to our founding grant. Our assets should not ever be less than the \$175,000.00 initial founding grant. All expenditures must be funded by future donations and interest earned.

Before asking for donations, the trustees wanted to have a clear idea as to how these funds would be used. The trustees identified four areas where the Foundation could be of financial assistance:

- 1) Publications: There are a number of pyrotechnic publications of benefit to the hobbyist fireworks community that could now apply for grants. The cost of disseminating urgently required information could also be funded by the Foundation.
- 2) Legal Defense Funds: Individuals and clubs representing the hobbyist fireworks community may now apply to the Foundation for financial grants of assistance consistent with our means to respond to such requests as outlined above.
- 3) New Fireworks Clubs: The limited grants available from the PGI (\$250.00) are woefully inadequate compared to the need for any new club to raise \$10,000.00 in capital to cover the expenditures related to the first year of operation, given insurance costs alone exceeding \$5,000.00. PGI and other club members wishing to form new clubs may now apply for interest-free loans and/or limited grants to assist in the formation of new regional fireworks clubs. Of interest, should a group of members wish to form a club, they could make tax-deductible donations to the Foundation and subsequently apply to the Foundation for grants and loans.
- 4) Insurance: The trustees of the Foundation are considering allocating \$5000.00 of our assets to purchase shares in the new insurance captive being formed by members of the NFA and others in the pyrotechnics community. This would be an investment, not expenditure. However, as with all investments, some risk entails. The trustees will debate this issue and report our decision in the next report from the Foundation.

We now ask for donations from all members of the hobbyist pyrotechnics community, that we may satisfy the

requirements of the IRS and begin to make expenditures of assets that fulfill our stated mission. The trustees have each pledged to start this process by making personal donations. Danny Clark Defense Fund By John Steinberg

It is with a very heavy heart indeed that I now seek your assistance in raising the funds necessary to provide legal representation for Danny Clark.

As some of you may know, Danny Clark was visited by the ATF and other agencies last year. While we had all hoped for a negotiated resolution to this incident, the federal government has decided to take this case to court and to proceed with a trial and prosecution.

Danny Clark did not, so far as I am aware, make and sell any destructive devices. He did not divert any display fireworks for sale to the public. He neither injured any persons nor destroyed any property. Such cases are usually resolved without recourse to trial, conviction or imprisonment.

Being a charitable sort, I am willing to recognize that there are two sides to any dispute. Perhaps the feds genuinely believe that fireworks clubs are merely subterfuges for illegal activities as described above. As we all know, they are anything but! By providing a vigorous defense for Danny Clark, we hope to establish that fireworks clubs are a law-abiding community. When errors in judgment are made, they should be resolved by administrative actions, not criminal prosecution.

Danny Clark has served our community well and faithfully. He has been president of the Crackernacks for three years. He helped engineer, with John Sagaris and others, a superb display at the 2002 PGI convention. He currently serves the PGI as a director of training programs for credentialing of PGI certified trainers. He serves as the web site master for the PGI web site. Danny has conducted numerous training programs, both for operator training and for law enforcement. He is always available as a friend to any pyro. He conducted our first PGI international training program last year. I have known Danny for many years and have always known him to be a positive influence in our community and a good and loyal friend.

I do not believe that we should use our legal defense funds to defend any person who does any of the following four things:

1) Sells destructive devices such as M-80's to the public.
2) Diverts display fireworks for sale to the unlicensed and untrained public.

3) Causes deliberate damage to property through misuse of fireworks.

4) Causes deliberate injury to persons through misuse of fireworks. Danny has not, nor is he alleged to have done, any of these things.

When a person runs afoul of the multitude of fireworks regulations (an easy thing to do!) but does none of the above, I believe our entire community should rally to his or her defense.

Last year we raised over \$7500.00 and expended \$5000.00. In conversations with Danny's attorneys at Brooke and Marshall, P.C., I have been informed that this legal defense, in a federal trial, where experts will be needed and many hours will be invested by the legal team, that defense costs could easily exceed \$25,000.00.

The economic damage to Danny's business as he works on his defense will be huge. The emotional toll will be incalculable. Let's shoulder the financial burden of raising the necessary funds to spare Danny at least that one burden.

Our community as a whole has already suffered as Danny Clark has reluctantly concluded that he must resign as Crackernacks president to have the time he needs to work with his attorneys on his defense.

I am going to ask the PGI to contribute \$5000.00. I am going to ask the Fireworks Foundation to contribute \$1000.00. I am going to ask the Crackernacks to raise and contribute \$5000.00. I am also going to ask our extended community to raise at least another \$10,000.00.

If we could get 1000 people to give \$25.00, we could raise a sufficiently large defense fund for hobbyist pyros (yes- a quarter of a million dollars!) that we could help educate and direct federal prosecutors toward focusing their formal prosecution efforts only on cases that involve one of the four clearly criminal acts defined above. Let us mount so strong a defense for all others in our community who are charged, as Danny Clark has been, that future prosecutions are avoided for those who have simply made errors in judgment, but who pose no threat to the public at large.

1. personally, pledge \$250.00-\$125.00 to the Danny Clark Defense Fund and \$125.00 to the Fireworks Foundation for use in legal defense fund grants. I ask every single person reading this article to do the same!

Here are the specifics:

- 1) Tom Handel and I have agreed to administer the Danny Clark Defense Fund.
- 2) Please make checks payable to "THE FIREWORKS FOUNDATION". Do NOT make them payable to me. In this manner, you are making a tax-deductible donation.
- 3) You MUST note on the check that these funds are for THE DANNY CLARK DEFENSE FUND. Otherwise they will go into the general funds of the Foundation. At least you'll still get a tax deduction.

Fact or Fiction - KNO3 Phenomena - Ultimately Intimate Blackpowder

An Old Timer

This discussion is specifically on reducing KNO₃ particulate size, not a study of charcoal type (fuel) or oxidizer (sometimes even sulfur acts like an "oxidizer") - zinc and sulfur.

There really is no reason to create faster black powder for fireworks devices than what traditional screening, milling, etc., produces. I posted this narrative not to support a definitive fact, rather to stimulate further curiosity and investigation of a phenomenon by individuals whose passion is the quest for the fastest blackpowder.

Phenomena - It seems from an empirical standpoint that each time the KNO₃ crystal is ground or reduced further in particulate size it has the potential of releasing minute amounts of additional moisture into the surrounding particulate. This observation might explain why many amateur BP milled mixtures compact against the side of the milling jar even though all initial ingredients are seemingly dry prior to milling.

Several possible factors affecting the amount of moisture in KNO₃:

- ① Amateur's receive KNO₃ that has been repacked (exposed to ambient moisture)
- ② Oxidizer kept in plastic Ziploc or paper bags (not truly moisture proof over time)
- ③ No desiccant used in primary packaging container or repack
- ④ Manufacturing/Packing process leaves minute amounts of moisture in KNO₃ crystal
- ⑤ Impurities in the KNO₃ are hygroscopic

Empirical Observation:

KNO₃ was ball milled in an optimized mill - 20 minutes later the KNO₃ was packed around the inside of the milling jar. KNO₃ was removed and placed on Kraft paper sheet - large rolling pin was used to reduce lumps to particulate quickly. Paper picnic plate was filled so that there was a 1/4 to 1/2 inch deep layer filling the paper plate. The plate was placed in a 600-watt microwave oven and heated on HI for two minutes. When the plate came out of the microwave the top surface had formed a crust or crunchy top texture that was easily broken up with a wooden spoon. Once the KNO₃ was cool it was reintroduced into the milling jar and milled another 20 minutes. This process is continued until the KNO₃ no longer creates a crust when dried in the microwave and/or packs against the milling jar after additional cycles of reduction/milling.

It is interesting that even this method requires repetitive cycling of oven and milling to reach an air-float particle size. I have seen KNO₃ (literally air float) with no free flowing additives that was processed this way sealed in a glass jar with desiccant pack, that did not lump or pack up when stored for over five years.

Interesting note: Sun drying even in the desert does not seem to eliminate the moisture like the microwave oven.

As to BP milling, it is imperative of course that both the sulfur and charcoal are "bone dry" as will. This is not to say that ultimately a percentage of moisture is not beneficial or down right necessary to the uniformity of the burn rate, and to providing the "solvent" for adhering the particulate powder into a solid mass for coming. The finer the particulate size and the more intimate mixed the three ingredients are for any given BP formulation, the faster and cleaner the powder will burn. Always mill repeatedly and be aware, dry powder is one thing, dry environment when opening milling jars is another. Static can bite invisibly especially the more airborne the particulate.

POWDERING AND PURIFYING POTASSIUM NITRATE

POWDERING

There are many sources for KNO₃. You can find small plastic bags of it called "size" in some Asian grocery stores. I've bought it at "Brite-Lite" based saltpeter [sic] at Long's Drug (and it had an expiration date). It's at most of the major home improvement centers as "Sharp Remover" (whereas historically it's been a sharp producer). In my line of work, there's lots of reagent grade KNO₃ lying around. But, the pyro favorite is fertilizer grade potassium nitrate – often with the brand name "K-Power". Figure on spending less than \$20 for a 50 lb. bag if you know where to shop.

My first bag of K-Power went right into my rock tumbler-ball mill. After an evening of milling I had a fairly fine powder. But by the next day, instead of having "air float" KNO₃, I had one huge snowball of hard packed powder. Other people have complained of the stuff packing against the walls of the milling jars. Since this nitrate was going to be used in rockets and fireworks I wanted to avoid the use of anti-cake agents. After several more similar frustrating experiences I decided to try drying it in an oven before milling. (One benefit of living alone is the free use of kitchen equipment.) A couple pounds of saltpeter spread on cookie sheets and placed in a warm (approx. 225 F) immediately forms a hard crust as the water leaves. The next morning I tried grinding this "dried" K-Power. It powdered much better but it too eventually formed a "snowball". When the powder from the broken up snowball was dried like before it again formed a hard crust. Obviously, there's water trapped inside the crystals that modest drying won't remove.

Now the dried-ground-dried KNO₃ not only powdered so fine that you can't feel any texture when you rub it between your fingers, but it also does not cake or form chunks months later in storage. Finally, air float nitrate!

PURIFYING

The fertilizer grade is notably different from the other grades. While the others are pure white, the K-Power has a definite brown cast to it. There is obviously something else in there. The presence of foreign substances raises a lot of questions, like: Does it affect the stability or ignition temperature? Will it affect the burn rate or color? Will it have the same amount or type of contamination when I buy it the next time? While generations of pyro have made fertilizer grade material work for them, it's good to know that there is a way out, a way to eliminate the variable of unknown purity. It's easy, it's rather fun and it goes by the cumbersome name – recrystallization.

Recrystallization sounds fancy but it is slightly more difficult than boiling water but less complicated than making coffee. Undoubtedly, people would do this for recreation if they knew what a richly satisfying experience it was.

It's all based on the facts that some chemicals, especially KNO₃, are vastly more soluble in hot water than in cold water, and, that crystal growing is a wonderfully ordered

phenomenon which by nature excludes foreign material. This is to say, a crystal naturally purifies itself as it grows.

With KNO₃ one can dissolve about half a pound in one quart of water at room temperature. But you can dissolve several pounds in a quart of boiling water. Once that boiling water cools you get a forest of beautiful crystals of pure KNO₃. So here's what you do:

Get a pot of water up to boiling.

Add as much KNO₃ as will dissolve.

Get it back to boiling.

Add as much KNO₃ as will dissolve.

Okay do it once more.

Turn off the heat and let it cool slowly.

Pour off the ugly brown water and admire your pure crystals.

Go back to the beginning of this article to figure out how to dry and powder the stuff.

RECRYSTALLIZATION NOTES

I haven't tried using an aluminum pot, and I probably won't.

KNO₃ is available in Southern Ca at Yamada Co. in Gardena for \$18.50/lb.

Adding KNO₃ cools the water. If you wanted to (after the first addition) you could stir the previously boiling water with your finger. What don't you trust me?

The more slowly the water cools, the bigger and purer the crystals.

You can repeat this process a couple times with distilled water and achieve ultra high purity.

You can evaporate the decanted KNO₃ solution and get more crystals but they won't be as pure.

You can add alcohol to get more KNO₃ to precipitate but it probably isn't worth it.

Enjoy your kitchen chemistry but don't tell any of the gyro chemical suppliers where you heard it.
